Whilst good attendance is extremely important for children's learning and wellbeing, there may be occasions where your child is too unwell to attend school. Listed below are some links to NHS advice on different common conditions.

There are government guidelines for schools and nurseries about <u>managing specific infectious diseases at GOV.UK</u>. These say when children should be kept off school and when they shouldn't.

If you do keep your child at home, it's important to phone the school on the first day of their absence to let them know that your child won't be in and give them the reason.

If your child is well enough to go to school but has an infection that could be passed on, such as a cold sore or head lice, let the school know.

• Coughs and Colds

It's fine to send your child to school with a minor <u>cough</u> or <u>common cold</u>. But if they have a fever, keep them off school until the fever goes away.

Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

• High Temperature

If your child has a high temperature, keep them off school until it goes away.

• Vomiting and Diarrhoea

Children with <u>diarrhoea or vomiting</u> should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least 2 days (48 hours).

• Chickenpox

If your child has chickenpox, keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over.

This is usually about 5 days after the spots first appeared.

Cold sores

There's no need to keep your child off school if they have a cold sore.

Encourage them not to touch the blister or kiss anyone while they have the cold sore, or to share things like cups and towels.

• Conjunctivitis

You don't need to keep your child away from school if they have conjunctivitis.

Do get advice from your pharmacist. Encourage your child not to rub their eyes and to wash their hands regularly.

Scarlet Fever

If your child has <u>scarlet fever</u>, they'll need treatment with antibiotics from a GP. Otherwise they'll be infectious for 2 to 3 weeks.

Your child can go back to school 24 hours after starting antibiotics.

WHAT IS MAYFACS HARDSHIP FUND

You may be finding it difficult to make ends meet at the moment, or going through a change in living or family situation. OTHER SUPPORT AVAILABLE FROM MAYFACS

FOODBANK REFERRALS: We are able to make referrals for families and individuals to local foodbanks for anyone in need of this support, be it short term or longer. Parcels are created for you, and specific requests/dietary requirements can also be accommodated. Collections or deliveries to your house are both available. Anyone who wishes to donate food to the local foodbanks can do so at their local supermarkets and help support others in need.





COMMUNITY FRIDGES/LARDERS: These are available at Heathfield, Hailsham and Uckfield and are open to anyone, no questions asked, to collect food as and when you need it. They are there to prevent food waste and support our environment by ensuring food goes to a home. They receive donations from supermarkets, cafes, local produce suppliers, and other generous donors, as well as the general public. Food generally includes fruit and vegetables, bread, cakes and pastries, and cold items.

Support Volunteers: With our incredible team of volunteers, we can support you should you need help with emergency shopping, getting to our activities, navigating other support services and agencies, as well as borrowing a wheelchair, DVD or Jigsaw!


